Emergency Management

- Each County is required to appoint an Emergency Management Coordinator (Michigan Emergency Management Act, Public Act 390 of 1976)
 - Directory can be found at <u>www.michigan.gov/msp/division</u> <u>s/emhsd/local-emergency-</u> <u>management-programs</u>
- The Emergency Management framework is designed to be scalable:
 - Local emergency management
 - Michigan State Police Emergency Management Homeland Security Division (MSP EMHSD)
 - Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA)

Mission: Help our community be prepared before, mitigate the impact of, respond to, and recover from all disasters

- Emergency Planning

- Critical Infrastructure Protection + Continuity of Operations
- Training and Exercising



What would we do if...

- A severe weather/widespread power outage event impacted election day?
 - I learned that it's not just election day we need to be preparing for (delivery of equipment, emptying of ballot boxes, etc.)

- We lost power to several of our polling locations?
- Our election staff were unable to safely commute to their polling location?
- We needed to communicate with voters of any operational changes?

December 2023 Tabletop Exercise

• Severe winter weather event impacting the February 27, 2024, Presidential Primary and causing widespread power outages

 City EOC team, City Clerk's Office, County Clerk's Office, University of Michigan, Michigan Secretary of State's Office, Michigan Bureau of Elections

"Can we reschedule the election?"

Lessons Learned

A disruption to elections would solicit a city-wide response



Communications

Promote various voting methods

Emergency messaging may conflict with the "get out and vote" message

Build relationships with your election and public safety partners in advance

Polling Locations – secondary power and backup locations


Staff continuity plan

Know what resources you have – vehicles, generators, etc.

Election Emergency Operations Plan

• Election Operations

- Voting timeline
- Polling locations and hours of operation
- Drop box locations
- Staffing requirements
- Delivery processes
- Agency Directory
 - Name, Title, Contact Information
 - Share EOP with those listed
